President's Notes:

Our teens are reviewing our principles. It's taking them longer than anticipated. I find this encouraging, because our principles are much more difficult to live than to say.

"The inherent worth and dignity of every person" – **Every person?** The guy who almost ran us off the road with his crazy driving? The co-workers who just took credit for our work, or got us blamed for their mistakes? The politician we love to hate? The terrorist who blew himself up along with innocent men, women, and children?

"Justice, equity, and compassion in human relations" - Exactly what do these mean? Justice is often cited to support the death penalty. My family has worked hard and sacrificed to reach our present situation. Is it equitable to take from us and give to people who did not work as hard, or squandered their money? Should compassion have limits?

"Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations" – How accepting should we be. Is there a limit to acceptance? Often we try to separate the behavior and the person. How valid is this?

Each of our 7 principles expresses a noble goal. I believe following them will lead to a better life and world. They can become very difficult when one tries to apply them to our daily life. How absolute are these principles? How far do we push ourselves to meet them? How coercive should we be to have our friends, our organizations, and our government live up to these goals?

All I've really done here is raise questions. I don't have satisfactory answers to any of these questions, or the many others that come up while trying to live our principles. I have some partial answers. I find my answers change with reflection and experience. I sometimes envy those who have all the answers clearly spelled out by a book or a leader. Most of the time I don't envy them, though. Being a UU is difficult, but I find it rewarding. I'll always have things to think about.

Notes From the Interim

“We must be willing to let go of the life we planned so as to have the life that is waiting for us.” –Joseph Campbell

Disappointment is one of the hardest emotions I find to go through. It sounds mild enough but when we have our hearts set on a particular outcome that doesn't happen it can be devastating. Depending upon how firmly we believe that what we wanted was our key to happiness, we may really feel for some time like our future is bleak. That is a terrible state to be in. One we try and avoid at all costs using stubbornness, blame or denial to mask our terrible fear of the future.

I've had many disappointments as I suspect you have as well. One that I'm thinking about today as I sit in my office at home in Framingham watching the snowflakes drift gently down was the one that brought me here. I knew I needed to complete a year internship at a UU church in order to complete the requirements for UU ministry. Because I didn't want to move my daughter and because it would mean an extra year of seminary, during which I was sure I would run out of money altogether, I didn't want to move away from Dallas to do it. That meant I needed to be accepted as an Intern at one of the two teaching churches other than my home church. I wasn't accepted at the big church where the female minister knew me and knew my home church minister. At the time this felt like a huge rejection. They

knew I needed this position—why wouldn't they give it to me? And the other church fired their minister before they could give me the position. I really wanted to give up. I hated everyone involved. But there was really no choice for me, so I had to venture out to another state with my daughter, our dog, and her lizard in a car packed to the gills to do my internship in Framingham, MA. I knew no one there at first. But this simple act of going forward brought me more new life than I could have ever imagined or ever achieved in Texas. I found real help for my daughter here; I found love, friendship and family, had a wonderful internship, a terrific job (with you after having been again disappointed in my job search in MA), and have a new home.

Several members this past two weeks are facing severe disappointment. I suspect there is not much that can console them right now. But each of them is courageous and will continue moving ahead because there is no choice, because there is too much that they have to give and too much that they love. But this too is courage: to take the next steps even believing that there is no happiness ahead. And if my life is any example there will be much life ahead for each of them too. It couldn't not be so. The more we can let go of what we expected to have happen, the more we can receive what new gifts there are waiting for us just beyond this strange turn of events.

I look forward to seeing you all again in Greenville from February 3rd – February 18th.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION NOTES

Believe it or not, I, Patty Gade, am your new RE chair. When Feryl first mentioned the position to me, my first impulse was “No way!” I don’t know anything about teaching children, I have no clue about religious curriculum and I am not qualified. I reconsidered though, because I knew the position had been vacant for a while and I believe that the RE department is the key to the growth of this church. We should all want to grow, because we need more members to contribute to the work of church.

I know in my own case, my family started coming here for the sake of our children. We had been allowing them to go to church with their friends, which seemed harmless. After all, Christians are good people. Suddenly, we found out that co-opting our children’s RE was not a great idea and we were just being lazy. One day Becky came home from church and asked to go to an “Anti-evolution rally.” She quoted something like “those people think we came from slime”. Scott and I both have degrees in science, so she could not have said anything more absurd in our household. We experienced a lot of tense moments, but ultimately through the tears Becky said, “Mommy, I just want to fit in...” Soon after that, my family wound up on the doorstep of this church. Time has passed and now my children are not long from moving on to lives of their own, but for sure Scott and I plan to be contributing members of this congregation for a long time.

My point is our story is not unusual. I think a lot of people decide to find a church when their children reach a crisis age. When new families show up on our doorstep, we must be ready for them with a vital, functioning RE department. We can’t create it when they show up. It must be ready, because we really need them to stay.

Which brings me to my pitch: WE NEED VOLUNTEERS IN RE!

We have come a long way by hiring a professional DRE, but Victoria needs our support.

There are a lot of different ways to volunteer in RE:

- ❖ Storytellers
- ❖ Assistant teachers
- ❖ Nursery rockers
- ❖ Meals during Harry Potter week
- ❖ Most importantly, we need teachers to commit to 1, 2 or 3 months at a time

Right now, we have two classes past the nursery age. Kim Smith leads the Tweens who have just started a unit called “Travel in Time”. They have made a time machine, which they will be using to travel back in time to study UU history, famous UU’s and to find out what it means to be a UU.

The Teens are led by Rich Elkins. They are starting a curriculum called “Living in UUville”. They are just laying the groundwork, but they will soon be creating characters and using them in role-playing situations focused on UUism.

Kim is going to need a break from RE shortly and Rich is soon to be the president of our congregation, so we are trying to prepare for replacements, as well as expand our pool of teachers and helpers.

To teach, you do not need any extravagant qualifications. Like me, you can be determined to “learn as you go” and you will probably find that you have more to offer than you thought. Victoria has lessons already prepared—we just need people who can implement them. And we are trying to be creative. We realize people do not like to miss the sermons. So, if we can get several people to commit to be in a team, we can rotate teachers so there is time to attend services, while still providing consistency in RE.

Please keep in mind, there is nothing more important than laying the foundation of our liberal religion in its youngest members. IT IS A BIG DEAL! So, I hope I hear from you soon.
