Reflections

. . . of Rev Ann Marie Alderman

Once again the time rolls round when you are going to be asked to make a financial commitment to UUCG. Every year, the leaders of this and many other congregations come up with a campaign meant to encourage their members and friends to consider and then declare what they can and will give for the following year. For a long time it has been common practice for congregations to first determine what their expenses will be, such as staff compensation, utility and phone bills, office supplies, coffee and paper goods, property and liability insurance, amounts needed to fulfill commitments to other organizations, all the things that need to be paid for. Then, after coming up with a total, congregations asked their members and friends to give what it needed to receive.

In the last several years, many UU congregations have turned this process around. Asking first for their members and friends to consider why they need to give, then to make a commitment that reflects their motivation for giving. Only, after financial commitments are turned in, does the congregation then determine how to spend the total of the monies it will receive.

There are some folks who are suggesting that it might be possible to do away with the yearly pledge drive altogether. So much energy goes into this one time of the year, which we set aside for the sometimes difficult and uncomfortable discussions about money. It would be great if we could talk about money in a more integrated, every day way. It would be great for it to be our common practice, to just "naturally" respond to how UUism makes a difference in our lives, by reliably setting aside a certain percentage of our income as if it was our investment in ourselves and our collective future... adopting a behavior of commitment and practice that shows how transformed we are by this way of being that is Unitarian Universalism!
