President's Notes:

Decisions, Decisions

One advantage humans have over other species is the evolution of communities. While we may not have reached the cooperative level of bees, ants, or termites, we work much more as groups than many other species. As we evolved socially, we developed larger and larger communities. Someday, I hope we can recognize the world as our community. Communities have many advantages over individuals. Specialization is one. People can focus on what they do or like best, perform that function for many members, and let others perform different tasks for them. Some tasks require more effort than one, or a few can perform. Our Congregation can do much more as a group than we could individually.

As a community, we need rules and guidelines on who does what and how we interact. These may be formal, or unspoken and just understood. The difficulty arises in balancing each person's different needs against the desire to be fair. To balance everyone's right to be heard and participate in decision making, and the need to make decisions quickly and efficiently. The need to obey the will of the majority while protecting the rights and dignity of the minorities. I don't want to be part of an ant colony or beehive where individuality is limited. Neither do I want to be part of a group where everyone "does their own thing" without regard for others.

Our Board has a covenant. We ask everyone to speak up, be honest, state doubts or concerns about a decision. We need to hear everyone's opinion. When we do reach a decision, however, we need to respect that decision. Sometimes we seem to "talk an issue to death." But if everyone has expressed their views, and been truly heard by all, we find a result that all can accept, even if it's not everyone's favorite option. We then expect Board members to support our decision. I think that is a good model for a Congregation. An example is Universal Health Care. We've adopted that as a project. We've discussed it, and determined there is support. We may not all see it as our top priority, but we can all work toward the goal, in our way.

Our Congregation has accomplished an amazing amount for our size. I see promise that we will continue to be a strong, positive force in our member's lives, and in our communities. May we continue to be amazing.

Board Tidbits


Tracy Donahue-Stine updated the Board on her efforts toward supporting the ECU Campus Ministry and starting up a young adults group.

News, Notes and Other Stuff

Is the Ministerial Search Committee Doing Anything?

That's a question I'm hearing often these days. Well, the short answer is, "Lots."

Not a lot was done in the first few months of 2006, but by late summer, we decided to meet monthly, but found that wasn't always enough, so we added another meeting as needed.

The first big push, as you'll remember was to survey the congregation to help us understand what qualities you wanted in our next minister. Then we moved on to organizing the Beyond Categorical Thinking workshop. Almost simultaneously, we began the work of assembling a packet of information that would go on the UUA website announcing our search and giving prospective candidates an idea of who we are and what we were looking for in a minister.

Once we posted the Congregational Record, we realized that we had to have a more detailed Congregational Packet ready to send to the prospective candidates. A lot of the work we'd already done for the online record could be used for the packet, but we also needed to add other information about Greenville, Pitt County and the surrounding area. We needed to sell not only UUCG, but this area as an attractive place for our new minister to want to live.

We got that finished just in time to receive the names of the prospective candidates from UUA. We did phone interviews and winnowed them down to the most likely and interesting possibilities. By then things were happening so fast that we needed to start meeting weekly as we prepared to bring in these people for more in depth interviews. There were neutral pulpits to arrange, travel plans to coordinate, interview processes and questions to plan, and all of the tiny little details associated with bringing the committee together with each prospect for a

weekend. This whole thing has made me realize that I never want to be a tour coordinator.

So now we are in the next to last phase of the process. Once we've interviewed the prospective candidates, the committee will choose one person. That person will come to UUCG for the Candidating Week.

The Candidating Week will consist of a week bracketed by two weekends. During this time we will try and arrange for the candidate to meet everyone in the church, attend as many meetings as possible, and in general give that person and us a chance to see as much of each other as possible. The person will preach two sermons and immediately after the second one, we will hold a congregational meeting at which we will vote on the person.

Our bylaws require at least 80% approval to call the new minister, but we are hoping for closer to 90%. If the candidate is accepted, the committee's work will change once again. After the voting, the Negotiations Subcommittee will enter into contract negotiations with the candidate. When that contract is signed by both sides we'll have a new Minister.

But we still have to help our new minister move and get settled. We'll be functioning as a committee for about 6 months afterwards to help in the transition. One member of the committee will help form a new Ministerial Relations Committee that will be a liaison between the congregation and the new minister to help on an ongoing basis.

I'd like to thank the committee members for all their hard and dedicated work over these past several months: Patrice Alexander, Joanie deGroot, Marcia Fletcher, Jan Salstrom, and Terry Shank.


tion, credentialing, and settlement for ministers and religious educators, as well as counsel in career development, ministerial-congregational relations, and financial planning.
