Tentative Certainty

As a school bookkeeper, I had seen the sad-faced father many times, coming to pick up his 5th grader for being sick or his younger son, for making faces at the teacher and terrorizing the 4th grade girls. Every week, another incident brought him to sit on the couch in front of me. "In the olden days," he reminisced, nervously, "teachers gave you a good whooping. After your hurtin', you'd get on knees and pray out loud for Jesus to forgive your sins. That would scare the devil right out of you."

The father had no idea that he could possibly be speaking to a non-Christian, so by his fourth visit in two weeks, I decided to crack his assumptions. "Who," I asked, looking him right in the eye, "picked what God to pray to?"

Silence filled the office. The father was no longer breathing. Finally the moment of uncertainty was over. The parent slapped his hand on my desk so hard my gourmet Jelly-Belly's jumped in their jar. "Ha!" he exploded. "Had me going. Gaw!" Which God. *As if!*

I am excited to create a religious home in Greenville that tolerates uncertainty, if for no other reason than to protect my jelly beans from further injury. Although our location will continue to be vociferously debated, the majority is in favor of 1) expanding our physical plant, 2) integrating more programming, particularly in the areas of children's religious education and social action, and to accomplish both objectives while remaining fiscally sound.

Next, a small group of dedicated members will convene to assess our building needs. You may expect this team to request your permission to pursue building and land opportunities and, if needed, hire an architect.

I hope that our congregation is strong enough to embrace paradox: remaining certain about our optimism for our church and open to spiritual ideas that refuse easy dogma.

Reflections Keliections ... of Rev. Karen Day

"You cannot think straight with a heart full of fear, for fear seeks safety not truth."

William Sloan Coffin

My friends and teachers, Kay and Carmen, are going out into the streets this week for a seven day retreat. They send word via email to remember them during this time and this quote comes too. Carmen speaks of how much she learns and opens when she lives outside, how she doesn't know what to expect. While my heart might be filled with fear at the prospect of seven nights in the Tenderloin, she sounds fearless.

But fear fills hearts everywhere. Are Greenville's streets any safer than San Francisco's? I have been stunned by the recent murder of Jahmel Little on Third Street. I walked up to his porch and placed a flower and card on the bare wood, noticed a basketball in the yard. Talking with a teacher in Halifax County I find that violence, including shootings, is also a fact of life there. How can children think straight when they fear for their lives? Or maybe they are not afraid, maybe they need us to be afraid for them. What are we to do? How can we think clearly, seeking truth?

As usual, I have no answers. But what I do know is true-we need to reach past fear. This congregation has done a good job of

working outside our doors. We pack boxes at First Born in Grimesland and we serve lunch at JOY Soup Kitchen here in Greenville. We need to keep reaching. Many of you are working in schools and with the youth of our community. Many of you recognize that we can't write off any child, we want all our Pitt County children to live in safety. I attended a recent community meeting for Citizens Against Violence and heard of renewed efforts to create programs for more children, heard calls for more parks and supervised weekend activities. Some of you have dreamed with me about an alternative Vacation Bible School where children of all races, religions and ethnic groups could come together to celebrate unity.

The above quote continues, "A heart full of love, on the other hand, has a limbering effect on the mind." When we reach past fear to love we find dreams and ideas bubbling. We experienced that in our congregation as we began to dream about the future and wherever our dreams take us, we need to include those who may never walk through our doors but who can be touched by our efforts to create inclusive, loving spaces for all. When we take to the streets with love in our hearts we open our eyes and we are changed, then we create change. Be the change you wish to see,
