President's Notes

**I've got some Good News for you!**

For those of us who came from Christian churches to Unitarian Universalism, I don't know if there's another word with as much negative baggage as the word "evangelism." It brings to mind ideas that one group has the answer for everyone, that all other groups are wrong in their thinking, and that it is our duty to get others to understand this and believe as your group does. I won't go so far as to say that there aren't UUs who believe this about our faith, but if they exist, they are surely a minority. The vast majority would believe that each person should seek their own path, and for some, that path may bring them to walk with us. For others, while they are welcome, their path may be better served through some other faith tradition.

As UUs, we frequently take some elements of Christian traditions and adapt them to our tastes and uses, while others we reject in their entirety. Evangelism tends to fall into the second category. We so reject the idea of trying to "convert" others that we almost hide our faith. I say that the first method of adapting practices to our tastes and uses is the more appropriate way to go.

To my fellow UU converts, I'd ask "how did you learn about UUism?" For some, the answer may be a UU they met, some came through the doors of their first UU Church for some other meeting of an organization using the facility, a few learn about us by seeing us in Social Justice work, and still others may have found us by doing research online or taking the quiz on Beliefnet. For me, my search predated the Internet, and I found Unitarianism in a book at the public library, in a town with no UU Church. All these are forms of evangelism, but without the pressure of there being only one correct answer.

As UUs, we do have "good news." The "good news" is that there is more than "one way," and we walk many different paths, but do so together. There are so many out there who reject religion in its en

Religions are poems. They concert  
our daylight and dreaming mind, our

to die and live by. But that is a small religion.


Full religion is the large poem in loving repetition;

You can't pray a lie, said Huckleberry Finn;

and God is the poetry caught in any religion,  
caught, not imprisoned. Caught as in a mirror

that he attracted, being in the world as poetry  
is in the poem, a law against its closure.  
There'll always be religion around while there is poetry

or a lack of it. Both are given, and intermittent,  
as the action of those birds - crested pigeon, rosella parrot -  
who fly with wings shut, then beating, and again shut.

## UUCG STRATEGIC LONG RANGE PLAN COMMITTEE (SLRP)

The first meeting of the UUCG Strategic Long Range Plan Committee (SLRP) was held on Thursday, March 5, 2009 at Patrice Alexander's home. Present were Patrice Alexander (Chair), Pat Anderson, Feryl Masters, Brenda Stewart. Laura Schroeder and Alan Bailey were unable to attend. The committee is planning to meet at least monthly.

Patrice had met previously with Rev. Ann Marie Alderman and the UUCG Board of Trustees to discuss their expectations and hopes for the Committee and its work. She shared this information with the members present. At this time the plan is to bring the draft SLRP to the congregation for approval at the 2010 Annual Meeting. The process of developing the SLRP will be designed to be inclusive, deliberate, and thoughtful. We plan to use small focus groups to gather information in addition to surveys and other types of meetings. We want the plan to have a healthy internal and external system focus. We want it to define our commitment to each other and to the congregation: what is our promise and what are our expectations? One role of the SLRP is to clarify UUCG's identity and purpose and to help define our current and future place in our immediate and larger community. We plan to have it be reflective of our current membership and environment; both have changed a great deal in the past five years since the current SLRP was developed.

The expectation is that the SLRP will contain implementation options with projections and plans for five and ten years out. Our long range goals and the process by which they are attained are both important. The goal is to develop a plan that will meet the needs of UUCG's current and future internal and external customers: our members and our communities. The SLRP will define UUCG's "reason for being" and therefore may address the following areas: facility/location, staffing, governance structure, Religious Education (RE), our Mission/Vision, congregational outreach efforts, membership growth and retention, small group ministries, and UUCG "branding."

The group agreed that the information helpful and thought provoking. Brenda and Feryl were able to give a historical context of the current plan to Pat and Patrice and we discussed why some of its "goals" have not yet been achieved. The basic timeline was approved by the group.

Congregational involvement and buy-in will be critical to the ultimate acceptance and success of the plan. We want the entire congregation to have input into the SLRP so we will be asking for assistance and volunteers. When we call on you we hope that you will say "yes" and will be willing to share your thoughts, hopes, and energy. Our next meeting is scheduled for 7:00 pm on Wednesday, March 25, 2009.
