President's Notes

Most years the transition from summer to autumn here in Eastern Carolina is pretty gradual as the nights become cooler while the dawdling sun still warms up the afternoon sky. The usual result is that choosing what to wear the next day is a study in chance and frustration and layering becomes the new reality. This year the transition has been sudden and unexpectedly unexpected.....and all of a sudden the upcoming three month holiday marathon of gatherings and celebration is my new reality!

Our UUCG reality is that our gatherings and celebrations have multiple purposes: to fellowship, to support each person's spiritual journey, to worship, to learn and grow, to raise funds, and to have fun. These are just some of the reasons we join together on a regular basis. Attendees of our current Adult RE class, "Spirit of Life: Exploring Spirituality for UUs", the nine week Adult Religious Education (RE) program led by Reverend Ann Marie, have been talking about all they are learning about that hard to define term "spirituality", each other, and themselves. Our Youth Religious Education Fall Gathering will be an opportunity to answer two questions: who is the best person to get lost with, in the corn maze and exactly what goes into "stone soup?" In December we will all find out what a Hymnphony is as Stephen Brand and Mort Stine coax the music out of all of us "couldn't carry a tune in a bucket" folks! UUCG had four members in attendance, "Standing on the Side of Love," at the 200,000 person National Equality March in Washington, DC, on October 11th. We had thirty members participate in the annual Greenville Crop Walk and we had close to sixty members and friends attend one of the SLRP focus groups. To do all these things costs money – the correct term is "operating expenses" and we all know that money is in short supply everywhere these days. At our last Board meeting we reviewed our budget, as we do every month, and talked about the difference between our budget plan and what we are actually spending. The reality is that our \$93,000 annual budget means that we need to

Reader's Theatre Returns to UUCG

On Sunday, November 8th, UUCG will host the ECU School of Medicine's READERS THEATRE as they perform Richard Selzer's "Follow Your Heart", during the 10:30 Service.

The play follows the impact of organ donation on donor and recipient families. In "Follow Your Heart" the wife of a man whose organs have been donated for transplantation seeks solace from her grief in an unusual and perhaps ethically questionable way. The story puts a human face on organ transplantation by looking at the issue from the perspectives of the donor's family, the organ recipient, and the transplant physician.

Don't forget that if any of our members and friends show a UUCG order of service when eating Sunday lunch at Heavenly Ham, on Red Banks Road, UUCG will get 10% of that bill. It could all really add up - and it's not like any of us do not like to eat..... We also have been approached by both members and non-members about renting our building for various meetings and events. Sometimes by being generous we can meet two goals.

Our Annual Service Auction is coming up soon – November 7th. Feryl and Brenda need your bright ideas and creative gifts of skill and time to make it a success. We also want you to invite your friends and families, especially the
