President's Notes

"From you I receive, to you I give. Together we share, from this we live."

In this month's column, you'll notice I am taking a much more practical approach than in previous columns. This month's column is a plea for help. It is a call for action. It is a reminder of the church's needs and of the commitment you have made to this congregation. Let it be the spark that inspires positive growth and change: in you, in the congregation, in the greater community.

First let me stress the importance of keeping your pledge current. Your generous pledges provide the most substantial portion of the church's operating budget. It is through your giving that the church finances the things that are important this congregation. Whether funding a professional minister, supporting our social action initiatives, or keeping the bathrooms in working order and stocked with toilet paper, the church is dependent upon the financial support that you have committed to. So please don't miss this last chance to make your tax deductible pledge contribution for 2013.

Next, I would like to address our ongoing issues with hospitality, with specific attention to the Hospitality Committee, and the difference between the two. I feel like our congregation does a good job welcoming visitors and members alike. We are wonderfully welcoming and accepting, as evidenced by the beautiful diversity among those in attendance at our services, and the liveliness of conversation afterwards. I wish to thank each of you for building and maintaining that environment. I find it ironic then, that we have gone nearly 6 months without a hospitality committee. That needs to change. Many among us equate the Hospitality Committee with providing coffee and snacks after the service. This also needs to change. Providing coffee after the service is not the goal of a Hospitality Committee. It is merely one tool or task that helps achieve the Committee's goals. A Hospitality Committee is a group of people, led by a Hospitality Committee Chair, who meet regularly, develop the annual hospitality goals for the year, and develop and organize the tools and tasks needed to achieve those goals. They then implement those tools and tasks, and measure their success or troubleshoot their failure. I will happily make coffee on several Sunday mornings a year, and I can easily help you find half-a-dozen other people willing to make a similar commitment. What the board needs, is someone who can steer the ship. We'll help you recruit the volunteers.

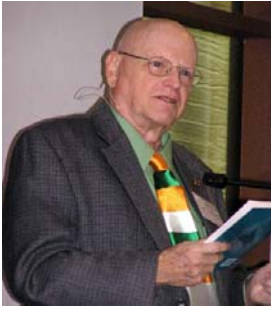
