Decisions, Decisions

We will be holding a Congregational Meeting on March 19. We have a number of important decisions to make.

Late last year, we discussed the possibility of buying the next door buildings and lots. It made sense financially, but some felt it would divert us from finding a place closer to our vision. Now we have 2 new possibilities. One is the Music Academy on Red Banks Road. We have also just found out that the University Church of Christ (opposite the Golden Corral Restaurant) may be for sale, but probably with a delayed occupancy. While all 3 choices have their own benefits, we can afford only one, so we must choose which one to buy, if any. I doubt we will make a binding commitment, but we need to know which way to proceed. Look at the choices, and help us decide what we want to do.

Last year, we elected a search committee to find a new settled minister for us. Two of the members have had changes in their lives, so they cannot commit the time to this they feel they should. We will be electing 2 replacements for them. Fortunately, we are still early in the process. As before, we will accept nominations from the floor, but if you may not be at the meeting let Rich Elkins or me know you are interested so you can be included.

At the January Town Hall Meeting, we presented a proposed policy for dealing with Disruptive Behavior. The UUA recommends adopting a policy, and this one is modeled after one developed by the UU Fellowship of Waynesboro. I encourage everyone to pick up a copy from the table by the door, or read it from our website. We will be voting on it also at the Congregational Meeting.

We are a member governed congregation, so we need input from members. We welcome ideas from our friends and guests, also.


This Beautiful Quilt Could Be Yours

Portrait of a UUCG Member

We are a varied and diverse group of people who come together each Sunday to worship. Although we have a Coffee Hour (actually it's a half hour) after the service, there never seems to be time to have an in depth conversation with everyone present. This is our attempt to bring you "up close and personal" with your fellow members. This month we highlight Sue Farris.

Sue Farris started life in Bethpage, NY, but soon moved to Pittsfield, MA, where her father had been transferred. She has fond memories of her childhood there, including family outings for picnicking and picking apples and blueberries. Sadly, however, Sue's younger brother died when she was 13 (he was 12); shortly after that, her father was transferred to NYC. The family moved to Croton-on-Hudson where Sue very happily spent her high school years as the well accepted new kid on the block. She played soccer, ran track, and was co-president of the ski club.

Following high school, Sue attended Franklin and Marshall College in Lancaster, PA. She started pre-med, but was distracted from this goal and ended up with a BA in Psychology. She "didn't know what the hell" she was going to do then, so she became a flight attendant! For two years, she worked for Arrow Air and lived in NYC with other flight attendants. She then married a pilot and moved to Charlotte, where Matthew and Ellen were born.

Divorce was imminent, and "nothing firms up career goals like knowing you're going to get divorced." Sue went back to school at Central Piedmont Community College to begin her journey toward becoming a Physician Assistant. She applied to seven PA programs, but

was not accepted. However, she knew she was on the right path. When she heard that ECU was developing a PA program, she, Matthew, and Ellen moved to Greenville in December, 1995. It was an act of faith. Sue was very driven to follow her calling; she knew she couldn't fail financially or emotionally. When the PA program began in May of 1997, Sue was one of the 20 students out of 475 who were accepted. She graduated from ECU in 1999, along with a Masters earned concurrently from Duke, and went to work at Walter B. Jones Alcohol and Drug Treatment Center. There she takes care of the female patients' medical needs. When Sue recently purchased a home in Winterville, it was her first tangible sign of success. She knew that she could take care of herself and her children.

Sue's number one hobby is belly-dancing; she's been taking classes for two years. She's still single but is "no longer looking."

While in High School, Sue wrote, "Though your ski slope of life may contain icy patches and moguls, plunge ahead with fearless heart and open spirit." She didn't know at the time how that statement would help her through her journey.

An Inquiry Into a Spiritual Path



What is Yoga?

Being prepared to start: To sincerely begin the pursuit of Self-realization is a most significant step in life, when the highest goal of life is taken on as number one on your list of things to do. The first word of the Yoga Sutras is *atha*, which means *now*. This particular word for *now* implies a preparedness in arriving at this auspicious stage of desire and commitment towards Self-realization, the highest goal of Yoga.

Definition of Yoga: The first four sutras define Yoga, with that definition being expanded upon in the other sutras. In a systematic process of meditation, you gradually move your attention inward, through all the levels of your being, gaining mastery along the way. Eventually you come to rest in your true nature, which is beyond all of those levels. This action and the realization of this center of consciousness, is the meaning of *Yoga*.


The true Self shines through: The true Self, which has been there all along, naturally comes shining through. The rest of the time, we are so entangled with our false identities that we literally do not see that this misidentification has happened. It is the reason that sometimes it is said that we are asleep, and that we need to awaken.

That awakening to the Self is the meaning of Yoga.

Like a mirror: Consciousness looks outward, through the intellect, through the mind, and then through the senses and body. It sees a reflection, like a mirror. It sees reality, a world, a self-identity, which it falsely thinks to be "me" or "mine." Through the forgetting power of avidya or ignorance, pure consciousness says, "I am *this* or *that*!" This is not all bad, for it gives the opportunity for the joy of awakening, through a journey called *Yoga*, returning to the wholeness that was never really divided in the first place.

Yoga Sutra: Chapter I

- 1. Now, after having done prior preparation through life and other practices, the study and practice of Yoga begins.
- 2. Yoga is the control of the modifications of the mind field.
- 3. Then the Seer abides in Itself, resting in its own True Nature, which is called Self-realization.
- 4. At other times, when one is not in Self-realization, the Seer appears to take on the form of the modifications of the mind field, taking on the identity of those thought patterns.
