This was a busy and exciting month within as well as beyond UUCG. Very importantly, we exceeded our Pledge Campaign Goal of \$90,000 to the sound of \$94,860 from 66 total pledge units. These units are comprised of 79 members and 11 friends. Thanks to all of you for your kind generosity. Not much could be more important to the tangible support of our congregation than to be more financially

secure. The Board attends very carefully to budgetary concerns. For example, we now have a paid cleaning person, which helps us present ourselves well. We are most grateful to Feryl Masters, Chair of Stewardship along with his committee and those who hosted home meetings for the Pledge drive. Susan Foreman, Terry Shank, Kay and Paul Alston, Lynda Lane, Patrice Alexander and Claudia Sundman all hosted gatherings.

The Council Meeting on March 20th was comprised of 14 of our dedicated committee chairs. The purpose of the meeting was to give and receive thanks with an emphasis on happiness. Ann Marie said it well with her greeting to the group when she said, "There is enthusiasm and participation in the cluster, district, and national gatherings, which make me feel blessed and honored. Something good is happening here at UUCG." I invite all congregants to become part of this vibrant committee's energy and consider becoming a chair for the greatest rewards. Happy Spring! The warming weather is a welcome thing, especially as the children are busy working with the season. They enjoyed seeing the crocuses they planted last fall appear in the grass by the vegetable garden, and even dove right into weeding the garden while they were outside! Last fall we harvested seeds from many of our vegetables and herbs, and the children have recently planted those in starter trays. Once the new sprouts have grown large enough we will be transplanting them into the raised beds, allowing the children to see the cycle come full circle. We look forward to once again working in the garden this growing season.

Both classes are about to progress into the next units of their respective curricula. The Tweens will be moving from "Our Jewish and Christian Heritage" to the "Comparative Religions" portion of our curriculum. I expect much rich discussion to come from this work, as it has with our other topics.

The Primary Class will be completing their unit on "The Unique Child," and extending their appreciation of their own uniqueness to how they perceive others. It's been a rewarding, multi-step journey toward better integrating our first principle. In April we'll move on to the "Knowing Who We Are" portion of our curriculum, and explore more about being part of the Unitarian Universalist community.

We have lots of exciting things coming up in the next few months. On April 24th, Easter Sunday, we expect to hold our next Easter Egg Hunt. The children always enjoy searching the grounds for their brightly colored treats. June 5th services will be held at River Park North, and will mark the end of our curriculum year. Starting the very next week, June 12th, Hogwarts will return! I know the children are excited about the return of "magical" lessons this summer, and we are working to make sure the children have a very rewarding and exciting experience.

The children's enjoyment of their work and participation in RE are readily apparent, which is exciting for us as our goal is to plan and implement meaningful, fun lessons for our children. None of this
