I am encouraged by the above quotation. Spring is a time of transformation, generally considered to be a time of positive and encouraging growth and change. We have weathered a particularly cold winter. We look forward to the spring. This year, I have felt a little misled by the old axiom describing March as "In like a lion and out like a lamb". It seems this year's March has been "In like a lion, out like a lion" with just enough temperate days in between to give me false hope of an early spring. I'm sure I'm not the only one looking forward to the "April Showers" that bring "May Flowers," or at least a little more meteorological stability. But the key seems to be looking forward to the transformation, the positive change to come.

I am, however, simultaneously discouraged by the above quotation, as it seems to imply that in order to undergo a positive transformation, one must start from a negative place. While that seems fairly intuitive, I would argue that just because something could stand to be improved does not imply that it was poor, defective, or insufficient to begin with. The antique collecting dust on a shelf in the closet still retains great value. It is not less beautiful simply because it is dirty. It's value is already established, and merely rediscovered by a thoughtful and detailed cleaning, perhaps followed by a showcasing. In other words, it's INNATE but OBSCURED value is REVEALED and then SHARED.

So what does this have to do with our congregation? We aspire to be a loving, wise, generous, and hopeful congregation. Does that imply that we are currently fearing, ignorant/arrogant, greedy, and full of despair? It is admittedly arguable, but I personally don't think we are. I think we already exhibit the characteristics we aspire to, we just aspire to be more so! Further, I think the key to increasing the value and effectiveness of our congregation lies not in trying to transform fear into love, ignorance/arrogance into wisdom, greed into generosity, or despair into



Rod's Ruminations

Happy almost April everyone! Outside my window the bushes and trees are showing signs of spring growth – way earlier than I'm used to in Ohio. The anticipation of the wonderful warm weather to come is just one of the reasons we came to Greenville, but it is one reason! You and this Congregation are all the rest of the reasons!

After my service focused on the third line of our Unison Affirmation "And Service Is Its Prayer" several people asked about the reading from Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.,

"Guideline for a Constructive Church" from a sermon he preached in 1966 at the Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta, GA.; so here it is:

We who must keep the church going and keep it alive have certain basic guidelines to follow – to preach good news to the poor, to heal the broken hearted . . . to set at liberty them that are captives. You see, the church is not a social club. The church is not an entertainment center. The church has a purpose. The church is dealing with ultimate concern. Sunday after Sunday, week after week, people come to church with broken hearts. They need a word of hope... The church heals the broken-hearted.

Secondly, the role of the church is to free people, people who are slaves to prejudices, slaves to fear. The church is called to set free those that are captive, to set free those that are victims of the slavery of segregation and discrimination and those caught up in the slavery of fear and prejudice.

The church must preach the acceptable year of the Lord, not some period beyond history; the acceptable year can be this year. The acceptable year can be any year when we decide to do right, when we stop throwing away the precious lives that we have been given, when we keep our theology abreast with our technology, when we keep the ends for which we live abreast with the means by which we live, when we keep our morality abreast with our mentality....

These are our guidelines and if we will only follow the guidelines, we will be doing what the church is called to do. We won't be a little social club. We won't be a little entertainment center. But we'll be about the serious business of bringing God's kingdom to this earth.

Religious Education

The Youth Religious Education Program has a Interim Director! I'm pleased to announce that Lilani Butler Masters has taken on this position. Lilani has been volunteering as one of our lead teachers and is already familiar with our program and our children. She is a life-long UU and grew up in our congregation's religious education program, giving her additional insight into "what we do". I'm very excited to have her onboard and am sure she will do a wonderful job!

Having a Director of Religious Education means that we have someone dedicated to making sure that we are using appropriate curricula and that we have all the necessary supplies each week. However, religious education isn't something that can be done by one person; rather, it is a congregation wide commitment. We need volunteers to serve as teachers and second adults. We need the smiling faces of our congregation's children, and a commitment from parents to bring their children on as consistent a basis as possible.
