# PRESIDENT'S NOTES



As I watched the Presidential debates this month, I was struck by the lack of civility and the personal attacks on each other. Politics, and even our general society, has become too accepting of insults, rudeness, and dehumanization of other people. I don't think we should all agree. I don't insist that we all like each other. I do believe we must treat each other civilly. Our congregation should be a place where everyone is treated with respect and courtesy.

I often think people learn the wrong lessons from history. People like to think the Nazis, or the KKK, or the Japanese, or the European settlers were horrible people. I don't believe this. People want to think that fundamentalist religious people are evil people. I don't think that is true, either. Most of those "horrible" people are or were ordinary

people trying to defend their country, or life style or beliefs. What we need to learn is how easily good, caring people can commit horrible acts once they start thinking of a group of people as "others". Once we remove people's humanity, it becomes possible to do horrible things to them. Military leaders do it to the enemy so soldiers can justify killing them. I see it in the way some police respond to "Perps". Police are called "Pigs" or "the man" to dehumanize them and justify attacks.

The great healers of our time refused to allow themselves to make their enemies "not people". Martin Luther King Jr, Mahatma Gandhi, and Nelson Mandela all remembered their opponents were human beings. They recognized them as people with feelings. Yes, they spoke out. They did not accept or ignore injustice. They led peaceful protests. But, regardless of how they were treated, they treated their foes with respect and civility. That attitude, along with courage and perseverance, allowed them to ultimately triumph over the hate and fear they faced. They recognized the inherent worth and dignity of all people, including their persecutors. I don't expect us to always match their strength of love, but it is a worthy goal. Our first principle is a great one, and one I believe we should always strive to live up to.

At our September meeting, we discussed the status of various ongoing projects in which the congregation has participated in past years and we selected recipients for the Board to consider for the congregational Share the Plate through the end of the year. These were approved, so we can announce the following recipients:

**October** -- Pet Food Pantry of Eastern NC -- helps families facing financial hardships to be able to keep their pets, rather than turning them over to already overburdened shelters. **November** -- Little Willie Center -- founded in 1990 as an organization to address the needs of latchkey children, whose parents work, seek employment, or attend school and as a result, must leave their children home alone. Despite adversity, the center has successfully operated for the past 24 years. The center is located in the heart of West Greenville, and despite the area's reputation, the center provides a safe alternative to being home alone. 
# **Caring Committee**
